USE OF ETHANOL-BLENDED GASOLINE (E-10) IN OLDER VEHICLES

James Harper gave an informative presentation on this subject at the Tyler Rally. Owners of GMC motor homes are aware that the gasoline available today is very different from the 1970-era gasoline on which our coaches were



designed to operate. Some owners have experienced first hand the negative effect that Ethanol-blended gasoline may have on the components that make up the original fuel systems, and thus, on engine performance.

Ethanol is grain alcohol which, in the United States, is primarily derived from corn. When denatured for use as a motor fuel, ethanol is mixed with regular gasoline in various quantities. Ethanol-blended gasoline is commonly referred to by the letter "E", meaning ethanol, followed by a number that denotes the percentage of fuel by volume that is ethanol. E-85 is an ethanol/gasoline blend at 85% ethanol and 15% gasoline. Only those vehicles that are designated as FLEX-FUEL vehicles are designed to operate on the E-85 blend.

The E-10 blend, 10% ethanol and 90% gasoline, was the subject of James Harper's presentation because this is the blend that is prevalent in the national distribution system of this country. It would be difficult, if not impossible, to complete a cross-country trip in the GMC coach without purchasing gasoline which is blended with ethanol.

Some problems that may be encountered when using the ${\bf E}$ -10 blend in older vehicles -

Deterioration or swelling and hardening of rubber components – Fuel hoses, carburetor seals and gaskets, and fuel pump seals may be hardened, dissolved, or distorted by contact with ethanol, causing fuel leaks.

Galvanic Corrosion - Corrosion caused by contact between two dissimilar metals when the metals are in contact with an electrolyte, like ethanol.

Solvent effect of ethanol – May dissolve and/or loosen the residual materials that coat the inside of fuel tanks causing fuel filters and lines to clog. Also, fuel tanks that have been refurbished and lined with material that is not compatible with an Ethanol-blend gasoline will be negatively affected.

General Corrosion, Pitting and Rust on Metal parts – Fuel pumps, carburetor floats, steel lines, etc.

Fuel Phase Separation – Ethanol attracts and absorbs water. If significant amounts of water are present in a fuel tank with gasoline that contains ethanol, the water will be drawn into the fuel until the saturation point is reached for the three-component mixture of water + gasoline + ethanol. Beyond this level of water, phase separation could cause most of the ethanol and water to separate from the bulk fuel and drop to the bottom of the tank, leaving gasoline with a significantly reduced level of ethanol in the upper phase. This presence of excess water and the phase separation may result in the engine hesitating and running roughly; or the engine could be rendered inoperable.

Lower gas mileage – Ethanol has a BTU value that is approximately 30 percent less than gasoline. The result is that E-10 gasoline should yield slightly lower mileage, a decrease of approximately 3 percent.

Maintenance and upgrades to make the GMC coaches more compatible with the E-10 gasoline blend –

Replace rubber based fuel hoses with high quality hoses that are compatible with ethanol. When doing maintenance on carburetors and fuel pumps, or when replacing these components, make sure that replacement seals and gaskets are ethanol compatible.

Install filter in fuel line between the selector valve and the fuel pump. Place filter where it is readily accessible so that it can be monitored and replaced as necessary.

Install a petcock in the drain at the bottom of each fuel tank. This will allow water to be drained off in the event that it accumulates and settles to the bottom of the fuel tanks due to fuel phase separation. With Ethanol-enhanced gasoline, once phase separation occurs, additives and water separators can't help. The only remedy is to remove the water/ethanol/gasoline from the fuel tanks.

How to prevent phase separation is subject to some debate.

For most of us, draining fuel tanks completely when the motor home is not in use is not a practical option. The most obvious solution is for owners to drive the GMC motor home at least enough to keep the current fuel from going stale. Depending on the source of information, the time frame could be as little as 90 days; or as much as one year. Buying fuel from facilities that move a high volume of product will diminish the chances of introducing old gasoline into our fuel systems. Under no circumstance should fuel tanks be left at half full or less for extended periods of time. A better alternative would be to top the tanks off to 95%, to allow for expansion. Adding a stabilizer will still extend the life of the fuel. However, the stabilizer will not prevent fuel phase separation.

The content of this article is provided for informational purposes only. As indicated above, differences of opinion exist on the subject of Ethanol-blended gasoline and how it relates to older vehicles. Each owner must make his/her own decisions as to the maintenance and upkeep of their respective coach.

THE TRANSITION FROM ANALOG TV TO DIGITAL HDTV -

GMC Classics member, Bill Carter, has been in the Television Broadcasting business since the early days of television. He gave a very timely talk on the upcoming transition from analog TV to digital HDTV at the Tyler Rally. The discussion was well-timed because the change will take place within less than a year.

Note: Most television sets, analog or digital, that are

connected to cable, satellite, or telephone company services over fiber-optics should continue to function as they do now.

The federal government set February 17, 2009 as the date when all full-power television broadcast signals must be sent in the digital format. At midnight on that date, most consumers with older, analog television sets will lose their free, over-the-air programming unless they have purchased and installed a TV converter box which will change the new digital signal back to the analog format.

The TV Converter Box Coupon Program was created by Congress to benefit households that wish to continue using the analog TV sets. U. S. households are allowed to obtain up to two coupons, each worth \$40, which can be applied toward the cost of eligible converter boxes. Consumers may get coupons by going online at www.dtv2009.gov, by calling 1-888-388-2009, or by mailing an application to PO Box 2000, Portland, OR 97208-2000.

The Winegard batwing antenna and the related preamplifier are mounted on many RV's. The Winegard Company's Customer Service department (800-288-8094) verified that both of these components are "Digital Ready". This means that those RV owners who have television sets that are equipped with digital tuners will continue receiving service, with no action required. Also, for those who do have the older television sets in the RV, the Winegard Digital to Analog Converter Box, RC-DT09, qualifies for the above referenced Coupon Program.

The best way to determine whether your television set has a built-in digital tuner is to consult your owner's manual or look closely at your set. Look for an input connection that is labeled "digital input" or "ATSC" (Advanced Television Systems Committee, which is the DTV format).

Sets purchased before 1998 probably are not equipped with a digital tuner. A few big-screen, projection televisions produced between 1998 and 2004 had a built-in digital tuner. Those sets purchased since 2004 are much more likely to be equipped with a built-in digital tuner. However, do not assume that this is a certainty. Even some of the newer sets are just display monitors that lack the circuitry necessary to pick up digital broadcasts. Some of these sets have been advertised as "HD-ready" or "HDTV monitor" sets. They can display digital and highdefinition signals, but they need these signals provided in the proper format, such as from a converter, or from a cable TV connection. All television sets that are manufactured beginning March 1, 2007 must include digital tuners. However, be aware that retailers may continue to sell analog-only devices until existing inventory is gone.
